Bible Study: Read 1 Corinthians 8: 1-13. In Paul's time what were idols and why was this an important issue in Corinth, anywhere with a Greek culture? The Greeks worshipped a pantheon of gods, all with their own temples and represented by idols. There was a "god" for all aspects of life and one had be careful not to offend them by forgetting to worship the correct god for the issue.

Verse 4 – 8 seems to imply that idols represent little "gods" that do not exist or have no real power. What do you think? As Paul teaches there is in reality only one God – the little gods are all representations of that true God's created order. There are no other gods in the cosmic order - but there are other supernatural entities responsive to Satan that we refer to as demons. The idols as inanimate objects have no actual power, but they can be used by demons as places of residence – the demons love the worship and will manifest themselves amongst the vulnerable (weak) people who worship at the idols.

Read 1 Corinthians 10: 14 -22. How does Paul's comparison of eating food offered to idols and participating in the Lords supper change or validate your thoughts above? Do those who eat food sacrificed to idols vicariously participate in the idol worship? What does Paul say gives power to the idols? Paul points to the Jewish participation in the Temple sacrifice and worship of God, to the Christian participation of worship of Christ in the Lord's Supper and concludes that those who knowingly eat food offered to idols and who have a weak or immature faith are at risk of encountering the demonic power often behind the idol or attached to it.

So what ? In Australia we do not often find food sacrificed to idols so why bother with this passage? Consider, as Paul was, what the relevance was for new converts from an alien Greek culture and think perhaps on those who come to faith here who came from other countries and cultures. Consider what issues there might be for us as we travel to India and Asia in particular on holidays? In the face of this teaching what gives us ultimate hope in what Paul teaches? Our multicultural society will increasingly bring issues like this to life again and we will need to consider carefully how we respond as leaders with a strong faith and what that says to others of less mature faith. Our hope is in the certitude that Christ has conquered death and the kingdom of the Demonic and as Paul says there is only one God!

Reading: 1 Corinthians 8: 1-13. Now about food sacrificed to idols: We know that "We all possess knowledge." But knowledge puffs up while love builds up. ²Those who think they know something do not yet know as they ought to know. ³ But whoever loves God is known by God. ⁴So then, about eating food sacrificed to idols: We know that "An idol is nothing at all in the world" and that "There is no God but one." ⁵ For even if there are so-called gods, whether in heaven or on earth (as indeed there are many "gods" and many "lords"), ⁶ yet for us there is but one God, the Father, from whom all things came and for whom we live; and there is but one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom all things came and through whom we live. ⁷ But not everyone possesses this knowledge. Some people are still so accustomed to idols that when they eat sacrificial food they think of it as having been sacrificed to a god, and since their conscience is weak, it is defiled. ⁸ But food does not bring us near to God; we are no worse if we do not eat, and no better if we do. ⁹ Be careful, however, that the exercise of your rights does not become a stumbling block to the weak. ¹⁰ For if someone with a weak conscience sees you, with all your knowledge, eating in an idol's temple, won't that person be emboldened to eat what is sacrificed to idols? 11 So this weak brother or sister, for whom Christ died, is destroyed by your knowledge. 12 When you sin against them in this way and wound their weak conscience, you sin against Christ. ¹³ Therefore, if what I eat causes my brother or sister to fall into sin, I will never eat meat again, so that I will not cause them to fall.

Thoughts. Paul lectures the Corinthians on holy living and worship, teaching them specifically about the challenges of idols in the culture that they lived in. See also his observations in 1 Corinthians 10: 20 about pagan worship as this will help you reflect on the passage for today. In the first passage (above verse 4 & 5) Paul attributes no real power to the actual idol because his intent here is to focus on the behaviour of those stronger in their faith and to show them that they should not use their strength and rights to cause issues for those who are weaker in the faith and who might be defiled by the experience of eating food offered to

idols. In chapter 10 Paul specifically reminds the Corinthians that idol worship has been a historical weakness and sin of the Jewish people. He reminds the Corinthians that there is spiritual power in all worship - he points to the Lord's supper as a form of powerful worship and he reminds them that while the physical idols have no intrinsic power the power that they represent, and what is actually being worshipped through them, is demonic in nature. He suggests they not participate in or acquiesce to the worship of other "gods" by knowingly eating the food offered to idols. So what, we don't have any idols in Australia do we? Well we do. At a spiritual gathering that I convened in Canberra Ken Fish the primary speaker related the impact of teaching on this subject in a recent visit he had made to Asia – we ended up praying for several people present who had a similar cultural background and who had been bought up with a strong tradition of ancestor worship and we saw them powerfully set free.

Paul recognised that all worship takes place in a cultural context. We have been used for many centuries to that cultural context (in Western civilizations) being friendly and supportive, or at least benign, in respect to our faith and worship. Such a position is no longer true and not only does the emerging culture of the 21st century disparage our faith but it actively seeks to deconstruct the culture that was built from generations of praxis of the faith in Christ. This emergent culture behaves almost as a new and fundamentalist "faith" and is raising up idols just as Nebuchadnezzar did. Idols that reflect this new "faiths" understanding of how the world should be re-ordered. This is an issue that is coming around again in modern garb. But remember as Jesus said in John 16: 33 be at peace and have courage for I have overcome the world. The great and powerful love of God as expressed in his son has overcome the idols of this world, no matter how many times they seem to resurrect themselves and seek to divide and dismember God's church and scatter his people.

Please reform and revive your churches, that we may be a shining light for our nation, may serve your will for this country, and may bring many to saving faith in Christ. We thank you for our indigenous Christian brothers and sisters, and pray that they would continue to be raised up in faith, love and hope. Please raise up a new generation of Christian leaders for all our communities and churches, and prosper their work and ministry.

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come, Your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and forever. Amen

Bible Study: Read Mark 1: 14-45. The Kingdom of God is near! This passage introduces Jesus earthly ministry and the idea of the Kingdom of God. Summarize the passage in about 10 dot points – what strikes you about Marks focus on the start of Jesus ministry? Where does Jesus commence his ministry and what is Jesus initial pattern of ministry? Discuss. For extra depth look also for similarities in Luke 5: 1-27 and Matthew 4: 18-25.

Is all sickness caused by demon activity? Does Mark distinguish between illness and demonic activity?

Why might Jesus command the demons he casts out to be quiet? What is the impact on his ministry of this deliverance activity?

Jesus healing of Simon's mother-in-law seems to us unimpressive in comparison to the other healings in the passage. What might the significance of this act be such that Mark chooses to include it here? Hint – see also Deuteronomy 28:22 and Leviticus 26:16 for Old Testament perspective on fevers.

What is the role and importance of prayer in this passage?
